I would like to welcome Harrogate back to Prenton Park for tonight's game.



Harrogate started the season well, with back to back wins against Doncaster in the League and Carlisle in the Cup, before suffering a narrow loss to Forest Green at the weekend, so we know they will present a challenge tonight.

Our own campaign has seen two narrow losses in the League, and a good win in the Carabao Cup against Barnsley. Whilst it is of course very disappointing not to have early points in the League table, at this early stage I am more focused on the performances. In all 3 matches we have created plenty of chances and I thought we were unlucky not to at least share the spoils against Barrow, who scored a worldie very much against the run of play, and against MK Dons, who had us under pressure in the first half but were put to the sword by us in the second. Against Barnsley, we showed that we have the ability to score in open play, and to hold our nerve when pegged back by the opposition. If we keep creating the chances, I am confident the victories will come.

However, this week results on the pitch have all been put into perspective by the loss of our much loved Associate Director, and Chairman of the Supporters' Trust, Ben Harrison. Ben's passing leaves a big hole in the Club. A passionate supporter for over 50 years, he put his heart and soul into helping both the Club and the wider Wirral community. We will miss him enormously and offer our heartfelt condolences to Polly and the family, who will always have a very warm welcome at the Club. In due course we will announce a fitting memorial to Ben, but in the meantime I hope you will all join me in a minute's applause in his honour on the 60th minute of the game.

Good evening and welcome to Prenton Park for our Sky Bet League Two fixture against Harrogate Town.

It's been a busy start to the campaign, with tonight being our fourth competitive fixture in ten days. The sheer volume of games provides a challenge in itself so the importance of the use of the squad is evident. We have a great group, and there is competition for places among them.

Our summer additions have adapted well to our environment and our way of playing. It's been great to see Kristian Dennis and Luke Norris continue to get minutes as they recover from injuries, and their quality has been apparent. The squad continues to improve, there are things that will be fixed along the way, and they will continue to grow as the season progresses.

My last programme notes came to you before our opening game of the season against Barrow. Although the result was a disappointing one, I felt we produced a performance that warranted more, and I was impressed with the application of the players. He's come back during pre-season and grown into the squad, and I don't see him as a young player, I see him as part of the frontline.

Then on Saturday we were unfortunate to lose at Milton Keynes Dons. We created some unbelievable chances in the second half, so it hurts to have beaten. However, if we keep performing and creating the chances we did then the results will inevitably come. This season is a marathon and not a sprint. There are 46 games in the league campaign, and we are pleased with the improvements and promise that is being shown by the squad. Despite this the players are hungry to win, and we remain as focused as ever on achieving three points this evening.

We are under the lights at home for the first time this season, and the group can't wait to walk out in front of our brilliant support once again. It was fantastic to see a strong following on the road at Barnsley and Milton Keynes Dons, and we always aim to match your efforts with ours on the pitch. Your support is appreciated by me, the staff and the players and we want nothing more than to produce a performance and result that gets Prenton Park rocking.



Ben Harrison



It is with enormous sadness that the Club has to report the passing last night of Associate Director of the Club, and Chairman of the Tranmere Rovers Supporters' Trust, Ben Harrison.

The Club would like to extend its heartfelt condolences to Polly and his family.

A book of condolence has been placed in the Club shop so that supporters can share their memories and thoughts, and we hope this will bring Ben's loved ones some comfort and strength as they try to come to terms with their loss.

A personal statement from the Chairman and Vice Chair:

"In the 9 years since we have been back at the Club, Ben became a key member of the senior management team, a trusted advisor, but above all a personal friend to us both. He was absolutely key to the Club forging a fantastic working relationship with the Supporters' Trust - something which is rare in football - and which has seen us collaborating so successfully on a number of projects, including support to the local community during Covid and beyond through the delivery of food parcels, the SWA2# community tickets scheme (now known as Nate's Tickets).

He dreamed big and was hands-on and indefatigable in bringing those dreams to life - as is so well exemplified by the new fan zone, which was his brain-child and something that

many thought he would never be able to make happen. That building will stand as a permanent legacy to his vision and tenacity, and it is tragic that he never got to see it opened, although he was closely following its progress right up to the day of his passing.

Although Ben became a personal friend, he was never afraid to challenge us when he disagreed with something, and we hugely valued his input, safe in the knowledge that he absolutely had the best interests of this great Club, and its fans, at heart.

He lived his life with passion and compassion. He was a fearless champion for the underdog, but also a creative and astute businessman - a rare combination.

When you meet people in life, one of the questions we always ask ourselves is "Would you have them in the trenches with you?" and the answer in relation to Ben was a resounding "yes". He stood up proudly for everything he believed in, he took on huge challenges and ran at them headlong. As Ben's family so beautifully said, "He died as he lived, fearlessly and without compromise."

We will both miss him enormously, as will everyone at the Club.

Rest in peace, Ben.

Opposition Luke Birch

Harrogate Town started off their regular season with a 1-0 win at Doncaster Rovers, thanks to Jack Muldoon's second-half goal on Saturday 5 August.



Harrogate Town

Harrogate's pre-season began with wins over Huddersfield Town B and Darlington.

A defeat away at Lincoln City was followed by a 6-1 triumph over South Shields.

The Sulphurites rounded off their pre-season with a defeat against Gateshead, and a 2-1 win over Hartlepool United.

Simon Weaver was appointed as Harrogate Town Manager in 2009, when The Sulphurites were in the Conference North, and has led them to two promotions since.

The club has grown massively under Weaver's stewardship up from having seven season ticket holders in 2011.

Weaver led Harrogate Town to the Football League for the first time in their history in 2020.

Harrogate have consolidated since being promoted, and have finished 19th in League Two in the past two seasons.

Still in-charge today, Weaver is the longest-serving manager in the Football League.

Harrogate Town was Weaver's first job in management, and spent the final three seasons of his playing days as their player-manager.

Two years into his stint at the club Simon's father, Irving, became Harrogate chairman.

Born in Doncaster, Weaver made his first senior appearances for Doncaster Rovers on loan from Sheffield Wednesday.

He spent time playing in non-league, before featuring in the Football League for Macclesfield Town and Lincoln City.

Weaver went on to play for the likes of Scarborough Athletic and Boston United, in an extensive lower-league playing career.





The Present & The Past

THE PRESENT / JOSH FALKINGHAM

Harrogate Town captain Josh Falkingham joined the club in 2017 and has made around 200 league appearances since.

At 5'9" tall the diminutive midfielder has been a crucial part of Harrogate Town's rise up the leagues, helping The Sulphurites to promotion to the National league via the play-offs in 2018.

Falkingham captained Harrogate to their National League play-off victory over Notts County, and their FA Trophy final victory over Concord Rangers in 2020.

Falkingham, 32, is a significant vocal presence in the Harrogate team. He signed a new Harrogate contract in January meaning that he will be under-contract with The Sulphurites until 2025.

Born in Leeds, Falkingham played in the youth ranks at Leeds before being released in 2010 without breaking into the first team.

The Leodensian signed for Scottish Premiership side St Johnstone, for whom he only made one appearance, before moving to Third Division Arbroath later that year.

Falkingham moved to Dunfermline Athletic in 2012, making 120 appearances in four years with The Pars.

The midfielder got his first taste of success, with Dunfermline Athletic, winning Scottish League One in 2016.

He returned to England in 2016, spending a year with Darlington in the National League North.



THE PAST / PAUL HECKINGBOTTOM

Current Sheffield United Manager Paul Heckingbottom featured for Harrogate Town as a player between 2011 and 2012 at the back end of his career.

The left-back made 21 appearances for The Sulphurites in the National League North as a 34-year-old.

Heckingbottom recently managed Sheffield United to the Premier League and won three Championship Manager of the Month awards last season as The Blades finished second in the second-tier.

Heckingbottom initially took caretaker charge of Sheffield United in the Premier League at the end of the 2020/21 season after the sacking of Chris Wilder.

He was re-appointed, this time on a permanent basis in 2021, following The Blades' poor start to the season under Slavisa Jokanovic, signing a four-and-a-half-year contract.

Heckingbottom previously gained managerial experience with Hibernian, Leeds United, and Barnsley.

Born in Barnsley, Heckingbottom started his youth career at the Manchester United academy, before departing for Sunderland in 1995.

He gained his first first-team appearances on loan at Scarborough, but never made a senior appearance for The Mackerns.

Heckingbottom played for a myriad of different clubs as a player, he played more games for Darlington between 1999 and 2002 than he did for any other.

He later went on to feature for the likes of Norwich City, Sheffield Wednesday, and his hometown club Barnsley.

Heckingbottom scored the only goal of a 1-0 win for Barnsley over Brian Little's Tranmere at Prenton Park in February 2006.





Saturday 5 September 2020
Carabao Cup First Round

In September 2020, Harrogate Town defeated Tranmere by penalty shootout 9-8 in a League Cup tie at Prenton Park. James Vaughan rounded the Harrogate goalkeeper Joe Cracknell, before Lloyd Kerry levelled five minutes later.

It was the first competitive game played behind closed doors at Prenton Park due to the Covid-19 pandemic, and Harrogate's first match in the competition.

In January 2021, a double from James Vaughan saw Tranmere Rovers defeat Harrogate 3-2 in a topsy-turvy game at Prenton Park.

Josh McPake opened the scoring for Harrogate, before Tranmere scored three around half-time, a penalty and a tap-in from Vaughan, plus a Kaiyne Woolery strike. Josh March later got a goal back for Harrogate.

In October 2021, Tranmere drew 2-2 with Harrogate at the EnviroVent Stadium thanks to a second-half Kieron Morris equaliser.

Jay Spearing's penalty, his first goal for the club, had opened the scoring before two Harrogate goals either side of half-time.

It was the first visit to Harrogate Town for most Rovers fans, following the reintroduction of supporters at games.



Opposition Dream Team

Charlie Stubbs selects a former Harrogate fantasy 'eleven'



1 - Goalkeeper: James Belshaw
Starting between the sticks is Nottingham-born James Belshaw. He was the starting goalkeeper as Harrogate Town rocketed reached League Two for the first time, helping win both the National League North and National League playoffs.

2 - Centre Back: Warren Burrell
Harrogate's current number 6, Warren Burrell starts at the right centre back. With seven seasons at the club, including starting in their play-off final victory against Notts County, he's been an important part of the club's recent success.

3 - Centre Back: Connor Hall
Just as capable in centre midfield, Colchester United's Connor Hall starts at centre half. A tall, imposing player, he was described as a 'big target' by manager Simon Weaver, in the summer of 2019, and it ultimately paid off. He scored the second goal for the Sulphurites in the 2020 Play-Off final, cementing their place in League Two,

4 - Centre Back: Mark Barnard
Sheffield-born Mark Barnard only played a season and a half for the side, but helped them win promotion to the National League North in 2003. Originally a forward but converted to a left wing back or left back, he was an incredibly attacking left sided player and was seen as one of the best in his position in the league, but for this side,



he will need to play left centre back.

5 - Right Mid: Michael Ord
Striker turned midfielder, Michael comes in on the right hand side. He may have only played three seasons for the Yorkshire-based side, however was part of the team who won promotion from the Northern Premier League Premier Division and Northern Premier League Division One, as champions, helping the club reach their highest tier in their history.

6 - Centre Mid: Lloyd Kerry
Kerry joined ahead of the 2014-15 season but couldn't hold down a permanent position at the start. Once he was in the team, he helped Harrogate reach as high as they ever have in their history, winning promotion to the National League, and then the Football League. He was also part of the team that won the 2020 FA Trophy.

7 - Centre Mid: Josh Falkingham
You don't score a winner in a cup final to help your club win their first major cup trophy in their history and not be counted as a great. Captain for the Sulphurites in the 2020 FA Trophy final, Josh hasn't scored many goals throughout over 150 appearances for the club, but he has scored on of the important ones. He is still at the club.

8 - Left Mid: Jack Diamond
A two-time loanee at the club, Diamond



was the club's top goalscorer upon their promotion to League Two in the 2021-22 season. A versatile left midfielder, he still has his entire career ahead of him, as he was only born in the year 2000.

9 - Centre Attacking Mid: Danny Holland
Member of the Harrogate Hall of Fame, Danny is the fourth highest goalscorer of club history. He scored 98 goals in 190 games between 2004-09, primarily in the non-league system. He was the top goalscorer for three successive seasons throughout his time.

10 - Striker: Luke Armstrong
Harrogate's number 29, he joined the League Two side upon their promotion to the league and made himself an important player. He scored 30 goals across two seasons for the North Yorkshire side. Ahead of this season, after the club had rejected transfer bids for him, Armstrong made himself unavailable for selection.

11 - Centre Forward: Jim Hague
The club's all time top goalscorer, Jim has scored 135 league and cup goals for the side across 17 seasons and two stints. From 1956-68 and 1961-74, he racked up over 400 appearances, placing him third in the all time appearance list. He was also the youngest player to play for the club, with his debut coming at the age of 14.



Luke Norris

Luke Norris got off the mark last Tuesday - and is the focus of our next player conversation

Luke, welcome to Tranmere Rovers, how has your time been so far?

Enjoyable! Frustrating with my injury, but after a lot of hard work I'm raring to go. I've been careful, it's a long season so I'm just making sure I'm 100% and I'm delighted to get out there now.

You're one of a few promotion winners to join the Club this summer, what did you learn in your promotion winning season that can you bring to Tranmere?

The experience of it is huge, you see the lads who've been brought in this year. We have a taste for it and want it

again, you go into the changing room and there's lots of people who've done it. This team can achieve it but it's down to us now. Also, we had a tight-knit group at Stevenage and the new lads here have all jelled with the squad very quickly. In my first meeting with the Club, they wanted to know the sort of person I am, so the aim has been to create a good atmosphere in the changing room. Everyone's happy, smiling, no sulking. Every club has bad spells, but we have the staff and senior players to push spirits up every day.

You're new to the area, of course, how are you adjusting to life up north?

I've been a pro for 13 years and I've always been down south so it's a big change of lifestyle. I've got family, a little boy, so it's a big change for them but we're settling in. I'm a big golf fan and there's lots of lovely courses up here! The guys have been really helpful, they've told me the places to go.

Have you picked up any sayings up here?

There's a few but I mostly get the mick taken out of me because I'm probably the most Southern here! Harvey Saunders does a little impression of me every morning which makes me laugh.



Who have you grown close with since joining the Club?

There are a few lads who play golf and I've played with Kieron. When we get some time off, I'm just waiting to get out on the nice links courses around here! We're all getting on really well, it's a brilliant group.

What are your thoughts on Prenton Park and the SWA?

I've played here before and the fanbase has always been very strong, all the players I know that have played for Tranmere say the same. Our aim now is to get the Club promoted and see the numbers rise. We want to see 9-10k fans at the ground every week, but you've got to give them something good

to watch and that's what we want to do this year.

Let's delve into some of your personal tastes, what music are you listening to in the car before training or a game?

THE SAUDI PRO-LEAGUE

There was an informative article on the BBC Sport website just last week asking if the recent 'remarkable' spending spree by the Saudi Pro League is just the start. According to one of its leading executives the answer is a simple 'Yes!'



British director Peter Hutton, who sits on the league's board says 'I think the budgets are in place for a number of years. I don't see this slowing down.' The SPL has lured some of football's biggest names since five-time Ballon d'Or winner Cristiano Ronaldo joined in January from Manchester United. They include former Real Madrid striker Karim Benzema and more established players from Chelsea, Manchester City, Bayern Munich and Liverpool's former captain Jordan Henderson. To follow that we heard of a world-record bid for Paris St-Germain forward Kylian Mbappe.

Hutton who has been a senior executive at Eurosport, ESPN, IMG & Facebook, said: 'I've worked in sport for 40 years and I've never seen a project as big, as ambitious and as determined to be a success.' Speaking to BBC sports editor Dan Roan in a wide-ranging interview for BBC Radio 5 Live's special 'The Saudi Story', he said it was 'not necessarily a bad thing' if European football was not as strong as it has been.

Hutton also put the Saudi spending into context, saying 'it has got the world of sport talking but it's a quarter or fifth of what Premier League clubs have spent this summer.'

City manager Pep Guardiola has said the Saudi Pro League's financial power has 'changed the market' for transfers and elite clubs 'need to be aware of what is happening', while Liverpool counterpart Jurgen Klopp has expressed concern about the transfer window closing late in Saudi.

According to Transfermarkt, SPL clubs have spent 409m euros (£352m) so far this summer – the fifth highest total in world football and more than Spain's La Liga's 254m euros (£218m). The Premier League



leads the way with 1.37bn euros (£1.17bn) spent. Asked how big a threat the SPL is to the established powers of football, Hutton said: 'The investment from Saudi is remarkable. It's certainly been a big acceleration. This doesn't necessarily mean that Europe isn't going to be as strong in world football going forward. But I would say that's not necessarily a bad thing. It's good that football has strength around the world.'

Saudi Arabia has invested heavily in sport in recent years and has been accused of using events to 'sportswash' its reputation. There are concerns over human rights and women's rights in the country, while same-sex sexual activity is illegal in Saudi Arabia, with the death penalty a possible punishment. Indeed Henderson's move to Al-Ettifaq drew criticism given his previous support of the LGBTQ+ community. Responding to these issues, Hutton said: 'The reason I got involved in the KSA (Kingdom of Saudi Arabia) was I saw some stuff that was happening on the ground. I look at the evidence I see. You've got 50,000 school girls playing football. You've got 1,000 women coaches. In 2018 there were 750 registered coaches. Now there are over 5,500. So you see that as evidence of change, and women's football development as part of societal change. That for me is the real attraction of this project.'

If Tranmere's thrilling rise through the divisions during the late 1980s and early 90s was, as manager John King described it, "a rocket ride to the moon," then Ian Muir was the expedition's Flash Gordon.

The striker became a dashing hero figure for supporters because not only did he score the goals that fired Tranmere from the Football League's fourth tier to the second, he delivered them in style. Muir had a skill set that put balls in the net and bums on seats. Without being especially quick, tall or strong, he had the ability to outsmart and outmanoeuvre defenders, create opportunities for himself and others and finished clinically with either foot or with his head.

He plundered goals so consistently that he became Tranmere's all-time leading scorer with 180 in 393 league and cup appearances between 1985 and 1995.

Although his talents and career blossomed in the teams built by King, he was signed by another Tranmere manager, Frank Worthington, who recruited the 22-year-old from Brighton in the summer of 1985.

Muir's early career had spluttered. He made barely a dozen league appearances during spells at Queens Park Rangers (where he progressed through the youth ranks), Birmingham City and Brighton. But once at Prenton Park, his game began to develop. Muir benefited from playing alongside Worthington, a former England international and talent, and notched 15 goals in his first season >>>

The following season, during which Warthington lost his job as Tranmere plunged into administration, Muir's tally was 25. Without those goals, Tranmere would almost certainly have lost their Football League status rather than engineer the final game escape that became a launchpad for King's rocket ride. Muir hit 27 league and cup goals in Tranmere's 1987/88 campaign in Division Four and 30 in all competitions the following season when they won promotion as runners-up. Rovers clinched a place in Division Three with a final game 1-1 draw at home to Crewe Alexandra, with Muir scoring the all-important goal.



Like a number of players in King's team, Muir responded to the challenge of playing at a higher level by raising his own game. Some, like Dave Higgins and Chris Malkin, had come from non-league football, a number of others were graduates from the youth development set-up, revived in 1987, that yielded a crop of high quality young players very quickly.

Muir believed the harmony and team spirit that developed among the group was key to their success. He told the Daily Post in 2013: "We were all good friends and we all went out together after games. It did not matter which members of the team you went out with because everyone joined in."

"I got better and better as the new players came along.

"We came from all over the place, Steve Vickers from the north-east, Eric Nixon from Manchester, Jim Harvey from Ireland and I was from the Midlands. A lot of the squad were Scousers, like Johnny Morrissey, Dave Martindale, Dave Higgins and the younger players who came up through the youth team like Tony Thomas, Kenny Irons and Ged Brannan.

"A lot of us had been released by other clubs and we all wanted to prove something.

"Tony Thomas called it a 'once in a career dressing room' and it was special. We were a very tight group."

Tranmere did not require a settling season in 89/90, qualifying for the play-offs by finishing fourth. Muir's contribution was 35 goals, including 23 in the league and seven in the Leyland Daf Trophy.

He scored one of the goals in Tranmere's 2-1 win over Division Three champions Bristol City in the Leyland Daf final at Wembley but a week later was on the losing side as the team were beaten 2-0 by Notts County in the play-off final.

Muir had notched 13 goals from 33 games during the following campaign when his career hit a turning point.

He sustained a cruciate ligament injury in a 2-0 win at Chester City on March 23, 1991, that would put him out of action for 10 months.



During that absence, King found a temporary replacement in Steve Cooper, who helped get Tranmere over the line in winning promotion to the second tier, thanks to a fifth place finish and the 1-0 win over Bolton Wanderers in the play-off final.

Then, in the summer of 1991, King pulled off a transfer coup by recruiting the former Liverpool striker John Aldridge from Real Sociedad.

By the time Muir was able to make a tentative return to first-team action in January 1992, Aldridge had notched 28 league and cup goals.

Even when fully recovered, Muir wasn't quite the player he was before the injury. His first-team appearances were limited by the free scoring consistency of Aldridge and manager John King's reluctance to pair the two marksmen together.

King argued, often against supporter sentiment, that Aldridge and Muir were too similar in style to create a good balance and he believed the hard running Chris Malkin was a better foil for Aldridge.

Muir started only seven league games in 1992/93, 10 in 93/94 (which yielded nine goals) and 12 in 94/95.

The parting of the ways came in 1995 when Birmingham City manager Barry Fry paid £120,000 for Muir and then played him only once.

Muir moved on to another brief spell at Darlington, then headed to Hong Kong where he spent two seasons with First Division clubs Sing Tao and Happy Valley.

After giving up the game, Muir ran a greetings card business in his hometown of Coventry.

We don't have to go back far for the first meeting between these teams, as Harrogate compete in only their fourth EFL season.



Indeed, Tranmere have the distinction of being the first team Harrogate faced as a league side, albeit in the League Cup, which started off the delayed 2020-21 season. Harrogate came away from Prenton Park victorious 8-7 on penalties, as the first round game was drawn 1-1.

No programme was issued for this game, nor for any home cup games this season.

Harrogate produced an impressive 44 page 'behind closed doors' issue for £3. Only 10 pages of these were advertising, one, of course, being for the synonymous Harrogate Spring Water. A page advertising live streaming for all matches home and away for £10 a match is a sign of the times, but no specific reference is made to I-Follow.

Seven pages delved into the life of midfielder George Thomson, who graced the front cover.

Six pages were dedicated to the Rovers, and a fantastic effort was made by Phil Harrison, who profiled players who have

represented both teams, down to those who had made only 1 or 2 substitute appearances for the respective clubs.

Harrogate's first visit to Birkenhead was on a Tuesday night in January and a 'double issue' programme was produced.

With Bolton having been the visitors the previous Saturday, it was not deemed productive to produce two issues for what remained 'behind closed doors'

games. Keith Hill and Mark Palios in their respective manager and boardroom notes had to cover the nuances of both opposing sides. In a quirk of fate, 23 programmes were still produced this season, as Tranmere reached the Play Offs.


This season was Tranmere's first foray into electronic programmes, which were offered to season ticket holders free of charge.

These were also available for non season ticket holders as well as physical copies which were still available to buy for £2.

The player action photos on the front cover, in this instance of James Vaughan, sported the legendary watermark, "where there is faith, there is light and strength".

This double issue came in at the standard 32 pages, three pages of which were dedicated to The Sulphurites.

The team line ups for the Harrogate match were on the back cover, relegating Wanderers to the inside of the programme.

Prentonian Personal Effects



For tonight's programme, our overview of Rovers memorabilia offers another look at printed matter - this time the postcard. Where as football trade cards are rather plentiful for collectors everywhere, the football postcard has proved rather more rare in the case of coverage of Tranmere Rovers alone.

The first postcards of any kind appeared in 1870 and were non-illustrated, as they were just simple pieces of card in fact issued by the Post Office on which you could write a message. They also came pre-stamped - users wrote the address on one side where it had the halfpenny stamped and said POSTCARD, with the message on the other side. By law, no other sort of postcard was allowed at first.

In 1890 however, pre-paid envelope was made available to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Penny Post, on the back of the 'Penny Black' the world's first pre-paid postage stamp introduced in 1840 and now a much sort after item by stamp collectors around the world.

Illustrated postcards were then produced by individual manufacturers and started to appear widely around about 1894 distributed in all sorts of weird shapes and size.

As far as football was concerned, it was naturally the high profile clubs, especially those who were founders of the Football League that figured on the very first related postcards, portraying team groups and individual players.

Rovers' earliest foray into the world of football 'postcards' was solely indicated by a team group photo, transferred to the format and ultimately used to raise funds for the benefit of player Ralph Holden in 1919.

Holden lost his leg in military action, and in order to attract a healthy crowd, it was Liverpool who came to Prenton Park on Saturday 3 May 1919 to contest a testimonial match for him. The records show Rovers winning 3-0, but also note that the gate receipts, together with the sale of 500 cards at 2d (1p) each, these printed by the Birkenhead Advertiser, added to the auctioning of the matchball for



£5 10s 6d, which in turn raised a grand total of £450 for Holden. With the First World War at an end and Rovers taking a step closer to their ultimate goal of League football, team group photos were now becoming commonplace, snapped up by supporters to send to friends and family across the country. It also included individual players and proved popular with the items sold not only at the Club, but also from the abundance of grocery shops around across Wirral.

By the mid-1930s however, the 'football' trend had taken a downturn, especially with the rapid improvements in magazine printing and the emergence of such football related periodicals as the 'Topical Times'.

A erratic scattering of postcards re-emerged in the late 1940s to the mid-50s, again depicting Rovers' team groups of the period, until the format all but died off as supporters again looked to other items to help celebrate their support for their club. However, 'The Homes of Football' collection of photographs taken by

Stuart Clarke opened up a whole new perspective of how the beautiful game was viewed. The collection featured Rovers on a handful of occasions, but only two photos were then chosen for the official postcard collection, which appeared shortly afterwards.

John Aldridge, the 'Goalscoring Thoroughbred' from 1992 was a prominent image, taken within the old home dug out at Prenton Park, while the diverse 'Neon Girls' was set against the backdrop of the stadium catering facilities. Whether or not it was our current food caterers, Willow, has yet to be confirmed!

From this point, stadium postcards were the order of the day, with Prenton Park featuring 'officially' on two postcards during the 1990s the first shortly before redevelopment in 1994 and issued by Aerofilms, and the second by North West Programmes following the construction of the three new stands a couple of years later.

They now prove collectable items not just to serious followers of the Club but all general postcard enthusiasts across the country with the rarer ones fetching high prices at auction.

"What, so every game we're going to play for 100 minutes?" queried the Spaniard. "Wasting time, from my point of view, is not going to be solved by extending ten more minutes."



Exhibit B, Raphael Varane, who hadn't actually played anyone. "We have shared our concerns for many years now," said the Manchester United defender.

"There are too many games, the schedule is overcrowded, and it's at a dangerous level for players' physical and mental well-being. Despite this feedback, they are now recommending longer games and more intensity. I feel these changes are damaging our game."

Want more? How about the PFA, which says the additional time is "too much" for its members to bear in an already "unsustainable" calendar.

Let's rewind here. The rules unveiled last weekend, both in the Community Shield and across the EFL, are designed to prevent the kind of niggly dark arts coyly passed off as gamesmanship but more properly described as cheating.

Pretend head injuries. Goalkeepers with cramp. Fouling a player, then standing in front of the ball to prevent a quick free-kick. Pretending you *just* can't make your mind up which way to lob a throw-in. If you've played football - or just watched the Italian national team - you know the score.

Previously, referees were simply instructed to add a nominal amount of time, which usually meant nothing at all.

But after a study revealed that the ball averaged less than 55 minutes in play during an average top-flight match, the International Football Association Board (IFAB), the game's lawmakers, recommended that every stoppage - no matter how brief - be added to the clock.

Cue outrage, as last weekend's games stretched to what in some cases amounted to an entire half of extra-time.

Squint hard, and you can see Varane's point. Ten minutes of stoppage time, multiplied over a 38-game season, is equivalent to playing four extra fixtures.

But hang on. Isn't that a bit like complaining you can't afford your heating bills because you keep receiving speeding fines?

The solution is not to eradicate the fines. It's to drive more slowly. The fine is a deterrent, not a punishment, and this is the point that appears to have been missed - wilfully or otherwise - by Guardiola, Varane and everyone else crying foul.

Nobody actually wants to see ten minutes of injury time. It's not a ploy to make footballers work harder. It's a deterrent, designed to improve behaviour.

The solution - call me crazy, here - is to stop wasting time. Stop feigning injury. Stop berating the ref. Stop putting the ball under your arm and legging it 30 yards after conceding a free-kick. Play fair, and - poof! - all that injury time will magically disappear.

Does that mean players will expend more energy than before? Yes. But if that really was a concern for elite managers and players, they could always go on strike and refuse to play in the expanded Champions League, which will add considerably more minutes to their workload. Or use the enormous squads they've stockpiled over the years. They won't, though. There's too much money riding on it and, if they're entirely honest, it's not about fatigue.

It's about old habits dying hard, resistance to change, and frustration that 'experience', 'professionalism' or whatever euphemism you choose to use has been called out for what it really is.

Implemented consistently, IFAB's clampdown has the potential to improve football as a spectacle more than any innovation since the backpass. Referees must ignore the noise and stick to their guns.

I know that these successes have given our players a lot of belief & confidence that they can compete & get over the winning line & it's crucial that we use that belief & experience to our advantage as we embark on a new campaign looking for more success." Tranmere Rovers Women have signed new players ahead of the new

season and it has created healthy competition amongst the squad: "I am delighted with the players we've been able to bring in. They all add real quality & good depth to the squad and there is a real healthy competition for places. One of the factors that was clearly evident as I attended the season opener here against Barrow, apart from the wintry rain, was the 14 extra added minutes over the whole game making it a 104 minute match.

English football's new radical approach to stoppage time and time wasting in general was always going to debate.

I first experienced it while out in Qatar commentating for the BBC at last year's World Cup. Initially you'd have to do a double take as you looked down to see 10 or 11 minutes of added on time. It lead to some significant moments very late on that cost some countries further progression in the tournament. I arrived back in England still to be sold on the idea.

I totally understand the principle- more of the ball in play every game, I'm yet to be convinced that this is the perfect solution. In fact over the whole of the EFL last weekend I'm informed the ball was in play over the three divisions a total of 8 minutes more.

The day after our defeat to Barrow I saw Pep Guardiola respond to Arsenal's equaliser in the 11th min of second half stoppage time in the Community Shield by retorting they'll soon still be playing at 8 o'clock the next morning!

At the highest level the subject of too many games in a crowded schedule has again reared its head. Whatever the level we are watching, we want to see the best players on the pitch not in the stands.

In my own industry concern has been raised with the broadcast of live games surrounding time slots, commercial breaks and back-to-back time slots where there could be very little if any reaction/preview time to the next match or even a struggle to be on air for the kick-off of the following game.

I also don't think the supporters, especially the travelling fans have been considered at all, particularly with public transport times and arrangements.

It certainly makes managers substitutions, and the strength and timing of them even more important.

Change is never straight forward and it's very early days in the season.

Let's see how it settles down but for me I don't want to see 100 plus minute matches every week.

"Galloping Goshers, Batman. What are they driving!"

Salford City are the next side to visit Prenton Park, as Neil Wood's men will make the journey to Merseyside in search of three points on Saturday 19 August.

City narrowly missed out on promotion to League One last season after finishing the season in seventh place. It was heartbreak for Salford in the semi-finals of the play-offs, as they were defeated on penalties by Stockport after winning the first leg 1-0. They will be hopeful of going one step further in this campaign, and have commenced this season with a 2-0 win away at Forest Green.

Manager, Wood, has been at the club since 2022 after departing Manchester United where he was head coach of the Under 23s. The 40-year-old was born in Stretford, and joined United at the age of eight. He made his name as a coach with the Red Devils, and led the development side to a variety of successes before taking charge of Salford.

For our first midweek home fixture of the new season, the past weekends' root through the club photo archives conjured up, amidst many, this image portraying a 1980's Fourth Division match with mid-table Hull City, and at Prenton Park on Saturday 13 February 1982.



The significance of the photo here is that it represents the eventual re-opening of the terraces at Prenton Park, including the Cowshed. For the first time since December 1980 – this when a section of the pitch advertising and surrounding fences in front of the Borough Road stand (now the Johnny King Stand) collapsed, injuring several young fans and temporarily bringing the FA Cup Second Round tie with Huddersfield Town to a complete standstill. With club finances infamously draining away, the club directors resulting investigation shortly after the game saw then instruct all the terraced areas of the stadium to be shut down until sufficient work could be carried out to repair and improve the facilities. This decision fell flat with most of Rovers support, which in turn left just the Main Stand suitable for all fans for well over a year.

In the midst of all this, an application was made by Rovers to sell the large car park area for a superstore to raise much needed funds, but was then turned down by the local planning authorities, as Rovers made every attempt to secure the club's future.

The eventual safety requirements were then met, through both donations and volunteer work, and enabled Prenton Park to be restored to almost fully working order.

On the day of the Hull fixture, just 1,735 spectators witnessed a 2-2 draw, as after a drab first half, a great second half performance from the hosts saw both John Kerr and Steve Craven scoring, only to see the Tigers grab a last minute and undeserved equaliser.

For the remainder of the season, home crowd figures never surpassed the 2,000 mark, bar one match however, where eventual champions Sheffield United, who were competing in the Fourth Division in their one and only season, visited Prenton Park. A pulsating 2-2 draw followed, with an 'official' final crowd total registered at 4,675.

The eventual plunge over the next few seasons – and this despite fund raising matches and a prestigious FA Cup Third round tie with Wolverhampton Wanderers – culminated in administration in 1987.
