



Good evening and welcome to Prenton Park for tonight's League Two fixture against Bradford City. We extend a warm welcome to Mark Hughes, his side and the travelling supporters, for what we anticipate being another challenging contest in this division.

We approach the game having returned from another long trip, this time to AFC Wimbledon at the weekend. Thank you to all the supporters who yet again travelled to get behind our team. It really is appreciated by the club, team, players and staff that the SWA is with us through thick and thin.

We started the match really well and I was delighted with the team's performance during the first 20 minutes of the game, with an intensity and attacking intention. 
Congratulations - and Well Done!

You can then watch the footage that some random geezer uploaded on his mobile phone. It's unreal.

COVER TO COVER

ANDREW STURGEON ON **TRANMERE V BRADFORD CITY 81/82**

Whilst the 1981-82 season may not have been a particularly memorable Division 4 campaign for Tranmere, it would have been for Bradford City, who as runners up achieved promotion. What caught my eye in relation to the programme covers that season was the garish colours used along with the generic illustrations of footballers, somewhat reminiscent of the era.

The cover of the Rovers Review (30p, 20 Pages) seemed to have a busy feel to it, which included a welcome message printed towards the bottom. In this instance this gave a hearty welcome to current Bradford boss and ex-Rover Roy McFarland and suggested "our lads will be hoping for three points and a good game of football looks to be on the cards". Possibly made in reference to this season being the first season of three points for a win, to attract more attacking football.

The blue text on yellow background was used for the programme cover from the third match onwards, replacing the blue on white look used in the opening matches. The generic action footballer, located in top left corner of the cover, seems to sport a polka dot blue shirt, not particularly similar to the royal blue shirts Tranmere wore that season.

The programme opens with 'On the ball with Bryan Hamilton', whilst pen pics of the City team follow on the next two pages. Following this there is the 'news desk' along with a picture of the most recent Rovers Lottery winner, being presented with his cheque for £1000. The presentation party, in early November of course included Father Christmas and his glamorous space shuttle crew assistants. Some crazy ideas must have been happening at Prenton Park and Birkenhead Co-Op around this time!

The lottery winner would still have plenty of spare cash if he forked out (no pun intended!) - just £99, for the 44-piece silver cutlery set



advertised by the match sponsors Hugh Foulerton Cutlery. It would still be another couple of seasons and sponsorship deals before the company became the main shirt sponsors of Rovers.

For those who needed some half term entertaining, the centre pages, which were usually taken up with match action photos, on this occasion contained a word search of the players, in what I can only assume was a randomly selected game, between Scunthorpe and Tranmere played in September.

Team line ups of 1-11 with a blank space for Number 12 were listed on the back page, above an advert for 202 Radio Merseyside (Also on 95.8 VHF), for those that knew their radio frequencies.

The Bantams official match day programme (30p 16 pages, printed in Huddersfield) showed an illustration of three emotionless players in a 'spot the ball' like image. For the eagle eyed, the

match sponsors were noted as "Messrs. Peter & David Jackson (Bradford City and Tranmere Rovers ex-players)". The twin brothers played alongside each other at both Wrexham and Bradford City, before arriving together at Prenton Park in time for the 61/62 season.

The Club Directory, on page two is difficult to read, due to this being printed in a theatrical typographic style, this sits alongside a short welcome message for readers. The inside cover page provides the only full-page advert in this publication. This is for Hammonds Sauce Group, with their cartoon of a 'supposed' Bantam kicking a football under the tagline "don't take any sauce from the opposition lads". 'Valley Parade welcomes Tranmere Rovers', takes up the centre pages. Whilst the text notes 17 Tranmere players, the accompanying team photograph only shows 14, which includes player/manager Bryan Hamilton and player/coach Ray Mathias, which shows just how threadbare "squad sizes" were at the time. The team line ups listed on the back page, did however manage to list 12 Rovers players. With both sides having ex-international, player managers listed within the team line ups, there was certainly some experienced heads on the pitch. Underneath the teams, the reader possibly finds out more details than necessary of the match referee - Mr George Flint (Kirkby in Ashfield) including him being "A pit head baths superintendent with an interest in interior design and bowls". Times may have changed.



Opposition Luke Birch

Bradford City won two of their first eight league games of the season, and narrowly lost 2-0 to Middlesbrough last week in the Carabao Cup Third Round.



Bradford City

Bradford have drawn with Mansfield Town, Grimsby Town, and Harrogate Town in some of their most recent games.

The Bantams only league victories this season have come in home games against Colchester United and Crewe Alexandra in August.

In the Carabao Cup, Bradford beat Accrington Stanley on penalties in the first round, before winning the same away at Wrexham in the second round.

Bradford City played host to Championship Middlesbrough in the third round.

The Bantams have bolstered their squad with former Tranmere defender Ash Taylor, midfielder Kevin McDonald, full-back Clarke Oduor, and midfielder Alex Pattison.

Bradford City finished in 6th place in League Two last season, losing to Carlisle United in extra-time of the play-off semi-final.

Manager Mark Hughes took over at Bradford City in 2022, after previously taking a break from football.

Hughes, 59, has managed teams such as Wales, Blackburn Rovers, Manchester City, Stoke City and most recently Southampton in 2018.

Born in Wrexham, 'Sparky' earned 72 caps for Wales between 1984, and 1999.

The attacker came through the ranks at Manchester United, then having spells at FC Barcelona, and Bayern Munich, before returning to Old Trafford and winning two Premier League titles.

He later featured for Chelsea, Southampton, Everton, and Blackburn Rovers, hanging up his boots in 2002.





The Present & The Past

THE PRESENT / RICHARD SMALLWOOD

Bradford deep-lying midfielder and captain Richard Smallwood joined the club in 2022, and has played in all of Bradford's league matches thus far this season.

He signed a two-year deal upon signing for Bradford, and appeared in 45 of The Bantams' league matches last season.

Smallwood, 32, was born in Redcar, and started his career with Middlesbrough.

He appeared 60 times in the league for Middlesbrough, before departing for Rotherham United on loan in 2014.

The midfielder joined The Millers permanently later that summer and went on to play 168 times in the league across his loan and permanent spells.

He helped Rotherham to promotion to the Championship in 2014, featuring in the play-off final which The Millers defeated Leyton orient on penalties.

Smallwood joined Blackburn Rovers in 2017, and he played 78 times in the league for the club.

During his time with Blackburn Rovers, Smallwood had to go in goal against West Bromwich Albion in 2018.

Goalkeeper David Raya was injured after Rovers had made all three substitutions, Blackburn drew the game 1-1 and Smallwood survived the final 17 minutes without conceding.

Smallwood joined Hull City in 2020, and helped the club to the League One title in 2021, and he played 42 times in The Tigers' subsequent Championship season.

The 5'9" midfielder made one appearance for England U18 in 2008, a 2-0 win against Austria at Hartlepool United's Victoria Park.



THE PAST / PAUL JEWELL

Former Bradford City striker Paul Jewell, started his famous managerial career with The Bantams.

Born in Liverpool, Jewell played for Bradford City between 1988 and 1998, making 269 league appearances, scoring 56 goals.

He spent time in the academy at Liverpool, before signing for Wigan Athletic.

Jewell played for Wigan for four years, making 137 league appearances, scoring 35 goals, prior to signing for Bradford.

After spending time on the Bradford City coaching staff during his playing days, Jewell took up the manager's job upon his retirement from playing in 1998.

In 1999, Jewell helped Bradford to promotion to the Premier League, finishing in second-place behind runaway champions Sunderland. Bradford's first season back in the top flight in 77 years, saw The Bantams embroiled in a tight relegation battle.

They narrowly avoided relegation on the final day, beating Liverpool 1-0 at Valley Parade, thanks to a David Wetherall header.

Jewell resigned following Bradford's great escape and took up the manager's position at recently relegated Sheffield Wednesday.

He struggled at Wednesday, and returned to Wigan Athletic in 2001.

Jewell helped Wigan to two promotions, one to the Championship and one to the Premier league, and he helped The Latics retain their Premier League status before resigning in 2007.


He later took charge of the infamous Derby County team that accumulated only 11 points in the 2007/08 Premier League, the worst since its inception in 1992.

Jewell, now 58, was most recently Director of Football at Swindon Town, a post which he left in 2021.


TRANMERE ROVERS 4 BRADFORD CITY 5

Steven Schumacher put the visitors ahead early on, Nicky Summerbee, Dean Windass, and Ben Muirhead also scored for The Bantams.




BRADFORD CITY 0 TRANMERE ROVERS 3

In 2007, Tranmere defeated Bradford 3-0 in the FA Cup at Valley Parade, thanks to a devastating Chris Greenacre double.

Chris Shuker set-up Greenacre's first with a neat dink over the defence, before Ian Goodison's long-ball found Greenacre for his second.

In 2021, goals from Kieron Morris and Paul Glatzel helped Tranmere to defeat Bradford 2-1 at Prenton Park.

Nicky Maynard spurned an almost certain goal. A cross-goal Morris drive, and an instinctive finish from Glatzel got the win over the line.

Opposition Dream Team

Charlie Stubbs selects a former Bantams fantasy 'eleven'



1 - Goalkeeper: Gary Walsh
Ex-Manchester United goalkeeper Gary Walsh goes in goal for this side in a star-studded Bantam side. Across ten years at Old Trafford (1995-2005), Walsh was largely a backup, playing 50 games and being loaned to Airdrieonians and Middlesborough. It was 1997 when he joined Bradford. Three years of immense form followed, seeing the side get promoted to the Premier League. An injury in the Premier League saw him lose his spot to Matt Clarke.

2 - Right Back: Ces Podd
Born in Saint Kitts and Nevis, Ces was one of the first black players to establish himself in English football. He went through the Bradford City academy before signing his first professional deal in 1970. He spent fourteen seasons at Valley Parade, playing over 550 times, the club's all time record. He got promoted and relegated twice, playing in Division 3 and Division 4.

3 - Centre Back: David Wetherall
Sheffield-born David Wetherall takes the first centre-back spot in the team. Coming through at Sheffield Wednesday, he played eight seasons for Leeds and nine seasons for Bradford. Playing over 300 times for the Bantams, he joined for a then-record fee of £1.4 million. In his first season, he played every minute and scored the decisive goal to keep Bradford in the Premier League. He stayed with the club throughout their administration, and retired in 2008, in League One.

4 - Centre Back: Rory McArdle
Signing in 2012, McArdle played five seasons for the club. He was a key figure in Bradford's meteoric cup runs of the mid 2010s, including scoring a

header against Aston Villa in the 2012-13 Capital One Cup semi-final, he scored in the 2013 League Two playoff final, and started in the famous 4-2 win against Chelsea at Stamford Bridge. He left in 2017, signing for League One side Scunthorpe United.

5 - Left Back: Wayne Jacobs
Sheffield-born Wayne Jacob starts at left-back and played over 310 games across eleven years. Signed from Rotherham, in 1994, he played for the club from League One to the Premiership, winning the 1996 Division Two playoff 2-0 to Notts County, and coming 2nd in the 1999 Division 1 season, and then straight back down by 2005. He scored 12 times from fullback.

6 - Centre Midfield: Bruce Stowell
Born in Bradford, Stowell played over 400 times between 1958 and 1972. He started in the amateur forms, became a part-time professional by December 1958, before becoming a full-time in June 1967. He became captain soon after, and by October 1970, he broke George Robinson's 55-year-old appearance record, when he made his 344th Football League appearance.

7 - Centre Midfield: Stuart McCall
The tireless box-to-box midfielder is a shoe in for this team. Stuart McCall played ten seasons for Bradford City, playing close to 400 games, scoring 45 goals. Despite his tough tackling and immense passion, he was rarely suspended, getting one red card in his career, in a 2-0 defeat to Charlton, in 2000. He was in the team that won the 1985 Third Division and was promoted from the 1999 First Division. He managed the side three times permanently, in 2007-10, 2016-18 and 2020.

8 - Attacking Midfield: Dean Windass
Dean Windass played for Bradford twice in his career (1999-2001 and 2003-2007) and climbed to the club's third highest scorer ever. He became Bradford's first seven-figure transfer when he first joined the Premiership-chasing side in March 1999. He scored 75 goals across over 210 league games



and ended up leaving due to Bradford's financial issues.

9 - Right Wing: John Hendrie
Scottish winger Hendrie played upfront and on the right and he'll play his later position in this team. He joined from Coventry City in 1984 on a free transfer, as manager Trevor Cherry tried to build a team to win Division Three. And they did just that, with nine goals from the right. However, the last game of that season, he played in the game of the Bradford City stadium fire. He continued to play most games up until his departure for £500,000 to Newcastle.

10 - Striker: James Hanson
Over 280 games for your hometown club means that Hanson leads the line for this Bradford XI. He scored 77 goals between 2009-2017, including 15 in Bradford's famous 2012-13 season, where they reached the Capital One Cup Final, scoring in the semi finals against Aston Villa, and winning the playoff final, which he scored in. He was also in the team that beat Chelsea 4-2, in the 2015 FA Cup, where the Bantams reached the Quarter Finals.

11 - Left Wing: Peter Beagrie
Known for his media work with Sky Sports, ITV, and Norway's TV2, Peter Beagrie joined the club in 1997, aged 32, from First Division rivals Manchester City. He was first loaned out to former club Everton before returning to help the club win promotion to the Premier League in 1998-99. During his time, he played 132 times, scoring 20. Towards the end of his time, he was sent on loan at Wigan Athletic, before leaving the club upon their Premier League relegation, in 2001.

AB: So, Connor, how are you settling in to life at Tranmere Rovers?

CW: I'm really enjoying it! I've come in after pre-season, so I'm quite late to the group. It's been good getting to know the lads, being around them, and now I'm starting to find my feet. Hopefully I can play some more games and get positive results.

AB: How has the transition been from free agent to playing football again?

CW: It's been quite tough. In the few

months I was a free agent, I was doing stuff off my own back. Nothing can really prepare you to go straight back in. I've put myself in the best position possible to make the transition smooth. Even now, I'm looking at the last few weeks and the next couple weeks as a mini pre-season. Since I got my first 90 minutes against Stockport County, I feel a lot better. Naturally, as the weeks go by, I'll be back up to speed.

AB: How do you keep yourself busy and disciplined over the summer as a free agent?

CW: I went to the gym near enough every day. One of my friends from school is a one-on-one football coach I also played five-a-side with my mates. Just little things to keep as fit as I can, as well as playing half-competitive football. Trying to replicate a routine you would have in a professional environment. You miss being in a group. Waking up with a purpose, training Monday to Friday and working towards something. I had to get my head round that, knowing something would come up. Day-by-day it gets repetitive, but it's about being mentally strong and sticking at it.



AB: We play Bradford this evening, your former club, what are your memories of your time at Valley Parade?

CW: I loved it there. I was there for three years. In my first season we got relegated, I felt my chances were limited. When we dropped down to League Two, that's when I played most of my football. I had a really good run of games for those next two seasons. I loved every second of it. Like Tranmere, it's a big club with a passionate fanbase. I admired that when I was there. Walking out at Valley Parade, packed out. It'll be a club that always has a big place in my heart.

AB: How valuable has Nigel Adkins' experience been to you in your time with the Club?

CW: His credentials speak for themselves. He's been at the highest level possible in this country. I've enjoyed absorbing as much information as I can from him. His day-to-day insights, how he sees the game and

individual players. Having that experience around you is extremely valuable.

AB: You were in a squad at Prenton Park for the first time against Accrington Stanley, what were your thoughts on the stadium and the SWA?

CW: I think I'd been at the Club for three weeks and still hadn't been there yet! It was really enjoyable, the team played brilliantly, and the atmosphere was really good. I'm looking forward to playing there in the near future.

AB: Let's get to know your tastes, what do you listen to before a game?

CW: I'm in a podcast phase at the moment. I listen to one where it's just two lads talking about anything for an hour, every Monday. It's just random stuff, but it's an easy listen. There's about 300 episodes so I'm just working my way through them.

AB: Have you watched any TV shows or films recently?

CW: Me and the missus are making our way through 'Breaking Bad'. We're just starting the final season now. I find it hard to stick with a series, but I've loved this. In terms of films, I'm a big fan of Marvel. Action films too. When I had some time off recently, I went to see 'The Equalizer 3' at the cinema.

AB: And lastly, who would you consider to be your role models?

CW: My parents, they sacrificed so much so I could get to where I am now. You don't really realise it at the time, but as you become older you do. Footballing-wise, I'm a big fan of Lionel Messi, and I admired Ashley Cole growing up. I was fortunate enough to meet him when he was at Roma. As a left-back, he was the top dog. Not just in this country, on a global scale. Him, Roberto Carlos, Marcelo. Those were the three I looked up to and wanted to play like when I got older.

DON'T LEAVE ME ALONE

My BBC colleague Phil Dawkes has published a terrific story on the BBC Sport website about a Brazilian fan of Santa Cruz. On the final day of the 2022/23 Brazilian club's season it had all come down to one kick, one penalty to settle a shootout and send the club back to the state top flight for the first time in a decade.



But, for Tiago Rech who had watched Santa Cruz for as long as he can remember, even when he was famously the only one, it was the culmination of something far greater. Born just five blocks from the club's 5,000 capacity stadium he was a regular supporter from the age of 10 watching with his father. As he became a teenager, school, university and a newspaper job eventually led to a life in state capital Porto Alegre, 120km away and a reduced diet of games. In 2012, though, Santa Cruz had an away match against Gremio in his new resident city. When he arrived at the stadium 20 minutes before kick-off and headed for the away end he found out that no Santa Cruz fans were there yet. He went inside but 15 minutes passed and still nobody else. Santa Cruz score and it is only Tiago there to celebrate. The television team covering the game soon noticed the lone figure in the away end and picked him out. That was when Tiago's phone started buzzing with calls and texts from his parents and friends. Tiago explains: 'the game went on and Gremio scored and they went on to win 4-1 – and I'm just there on my own the whole time.'

The next morning, an image of him sat alone in the

stand, a half-drunk plastic cup next to him, was on the front page of the paper at which he worked. 'Don't Leave Me Alone' read the headline. Soon, the image and story were heading around the world and drawing comments courtesy of online coverage and a YouTube clip that quickly rocketed past 1m views. But that wasn't the end of the story.

A year later and after Santa Cruz had just been relegated to the second tier, Tiago was living back home having left his job. A chance meeting with the then club president gave him the chance to turn his hobby into something more. He was offered a job at the club in communication and marketing, he describes it as a 'crash course in football administration'. Unlike many fellow supporters he now understood how difficult running a football club was 'lack of money, resources, sponsors, just a general lack of support'. He built relationships, produced a long-term recruitment plan for players and started to move the club on an upward curve. So when the time to elect a new president came around, at the age of 27 – Tiago was the man. His dream turned into a nightmare, though, the club started to run out of money, attendances dropped, debts increased and he started to use his own and his family's savings to keep the club going. Santa Cruz avoided relegation but his one year of presidency had taken a heavy toll. His doctor diagnosed Tiago as having depression and he stopped running the club. He moved back to Port Alegre and returned to journalism.

The clubs fortunes did not improve and in 2018 were relegated to the third tier. Then a friend and business owner made a plea to him to return to the club as president. Despite all that had gone before, he decided to take up the challenge, but armed with lessons from the past. By 2012 things had improved – he signed off his tenure as president with the club's return to the second tier.

And so back to the penalty shootout last season. Now, he is one of thousands of fans present – and cool as you like, Mauricio scores the penalty and Santa Cruz are back in the state top flight. Reporters seek out Tiago, to remind everyone of his story, his sacrifices and, now to share his joy.





ANDREW STURGEON ON ARSENAL V TRANMERE 73/74 LEAGUE CUP

MATCHDAY PROGRAMMES

The self-titled Arsenal programme, priced at 5 pence for 16 pages was produced for the League Cup game against Tranmere, in October 1973, in what was the first competitive fixture between the sides.



The programme cover remained the same as the one The Gunners used for their league fixtures that season. The match details, along with club logo are placed in a white band towards the upper half of the cover, in what is predominately a red cover. The lower section has four black and white match action photos from the previous season, and above these is an old style leather football with a nod to the reference that this season was the 60th at Highbury.

Unusually the programme contained no advertisements whatsoever and was purely focused on club content, as Arsenal remained resistant to such additional income streams back in those days.

The programme opens with the "Topics of the Week" section, and discusses how elusive, winning the League Cup has been for Arsenal; despite being runners up in 1968 and 1969 Arsenal had not had the best of luck in this competition. The editorial notes "It is our performances at home which have been our weakness" and "It being curious that five out of seven times a poor performance at home has cost us the match". Maybe the visiting players reading this pre match could see an opportunity.

Readers' letters are published over a



page and a half, and these include two disgruntled writers finding it difficult to obtain match programmes from the Arsenal shop after the match, and one querying why none of the action photos on the cover were from Highbury.

The 'current' tables of the three leagues Arsenal are competing in (Division 1, South East Counties League and Football Combination) along with the Division 3 table are all set out. The latter shows Rovers sitting in 2nd place on 10 points after 7 games. Having won 4, drawn 2 and lost only once. The table not quite up-to-date and reflective of the previous game, which Rovers had lost 1-0 at home against Halifax.

A significant portion of the programme, amounting to six and half pages, are given over to the visitors. Six black and white photos are used to set the scene of what life was like at Prenton Park. In addition, a vertically placed Tranmere team photo takes up a page, ensuring readers have to twist their necks or the programme to study the team and marvel at the wonderful sideburns and mullets the players were sporting.

A page sets out the pen pictures of the Rovers team under the club crest, but fails to mention either Ray

Mathias or Hugh McAuley who both started in the team that night. The authors 'jibes' on some of the Rovers team, may have also proved the catalyst in motivating them to win. These included for keeper Dick Johnson, "who is 6ft 1in weighs 12st 10lb... and is still growing" and goal scorer Eddie Loyden "He is powerful in the air. Covers a lot of ground too - but that is the story of this Liverpool lads career because Tranmere are his eighth club".

The predicted starting eleven for both teams are set out on the back page, along with the team colours and officials, and underneath this is the programme of live pre match music to be played by the Metropolitan Police Band.

As for the programme, it is understood the print run was significantly lower than normal, as the tie was not particularly inspiring for the hosts. This is reflected in the attendance of 20,337, which was close to ten thousand less than the league average at Highbury that season. Despite this, the issue can easily be found today and is likely to be in the programme collections of fans from both teams, as the tie will forever be etched in the folklore of both Rovers and Highbury.



Prentonian Personal Effects

Continuing along our theme for the evening based on the events at Highbury in October 1973, we've now devoted tonight's 'personal effects' page to specifically the actual match tickets that were issued to supporters that night.



There were no less than six different designs and formats, each reserved for the famous stands at the old stadium. Like several clubs in that era, the ticket designs were quite distinctive, and were well-recognised in later years, especially when Arsenal decided to give up the old stadium and move to pastures new. Occasionally these tickets for the League Cup have appeared on Ebay, and have sold for various prices, while a double set of tickets went to auction in London recently, and alongside items relating to the event.

The basic history of the original stadium indicates it was built in 1913, this when Woolwich Arsenal moved from the Manor Ground in Plumstead, South East London to Highbury, leasing the recreation fields of St John's College of Divinity for £20,000. The stadium was hurriedly built over the summer of that year, and was designed by Archibald Leitch, architect of many other football grounds of that era. It featured a single stand on the eastern side and the other three sides had banked terracing. The new stadium cost £125,000. It opened whilst not fully complete, with Arsenal's first match of the 1913/14 season, a 2-1 Second Division win against Leicester Fosse on 6 September 1913, before Highbury hosted its first England match in 1920.

In its later years Arsenal's success during the 1990s and 2000s meant that virtually every home match was filled to near capacity. Restrictions, such as the East Stand's status as a listed building and the fact the

stadium was surrounded on all sides by a residential area, made any future expansion of Highbury difficult and expensive, although the club's directors would have liked to have kept Arsenal at a modernised and expanded Highbury. In November 1999, Arsenal decided to leave Highbury and construct a new 60,000-seat stadium in nearby Ashburton Grove, which then opened in July 2006. Arsenal's final game at the stadium was a FA Premier League match against Wigan the final day of the 2005/06 season.

No supporter of Reading was surprised by the news that the club's owner, Dai Yongge, had failed to pay HMRC this month. Exactly the same thing happened in June, when the Royals were served with a winding up petition.

In fact, Reading have lost a total of 16 points since Yongge took control of the club in 2017 and have suffered deductions in each of their last three campaigns.

He's continually missed wage payments. Failed to comply with the terms of an EFL business plan. Just last week, the 55-year-old was charged with misconduct for failing to deposit 125% per cent of the club's monthly wage bill by September 12.

The EFL said it was "necessary" to take further proceedings against Dai personally for repeatedly failing to meet the club's funding requirements, which was having a "detrimental impact" on the Royals and their wider stakeholders.

You can say that again. Relegated last term after being docked six points in April, the Royals have spent the last two years under a transfer embargo and began the weekend in the League One relegation zone.

But what does a charge for Yongge actually achieve? The Chinese businessman has proved through word and deed that he's finished with English football. What does he care about a misconduct charge?

Not for the first time, it raises the question of whether points deductions are an appropriate punishment for the failings of an owner, and whether more can be done to prevent football clubs falling - or more appositely, remaining - in the wrong hands.

The other two clubs he owned, Beijing Renhe in China and KSV Roeselare in Belgium, both folded in the aftermath of relegation and financial problems. Unfortunately, these insolvencies both occurred after he bought Reading, so weren't flagged up by the EFL's owners and directors test. This is the crux of the issue.

Once an owner has the keys to the stadium and his name in the ledger at Companies House, there is nothing to stop that person from running riot. They can asset strip. Overspend. Sell the stadium. Take out loans at rates that would make Wonga blush. Or, in Reading's case, leave workers out of pocket by failing to pay wages on time.

The only forms of redress available to the EFL are sporting sanctions like transfer embargoes and points deductions, but neither solve the problem. In many cases, they make it worse.

One solution widely suggested is a licensing system, which would require prospective owners to prove their capacity to run a football club prior to taking charge, then continue to meet certain criteria thereafter under threat of the licence being revoked.

What happens then, though? Even if they could somehow be compelled to sell, you need a buyer willing to take on the club. A bad owner is still better than no owner at all.

It's a devilishly tricky issue, and perhaps the only way to solve it is through real-time accounting so that the EFL is aware of financial issues before they spiral out of control. As to what the authorities then do about it... answers on a postcard, please.



The encouraging performances of Sam Taylor this season and indeed our recent signings of Conor Robson, Joe Starbuck and Jean Belehovan have only reinforced how exciting it is as a fan to see a young talent break through and be given an opportunity. Here at this club of course the list of local talent making their first team impact is longer than most.

However, for various reasons it is getting harder for teenagers to make their mark. Our three recent arrivals have all spent time at 'bigger clubs' without being offered a chance to take it further.

Only last week a report quoted that from 4,109 category one academy footballers, 70% weren't even handed a contract at any of the 92 football league clubs. In fact only 1 in 20 players even made more than 20 appearances in the top four divisions.

It's more cut-throat than ever. I've witnessed the system first hand as both of my sons have had spells in academy football. I've also covered the likes of the FA Youth cup earlier in my career and been close to players and families who've been successful in that competition and then not gone on to have football in their lives thereafter.

There are more children being taken into academies and less players being offered contracts, that's why I was delighted earlier this year to see the PFA recommendations to government for more support and care given to young player welfare, especially those 'rejected'. A player isn't eligible currently for PFA membership currently until they are 16- for many that it is too late.

Everyone should dream, of that there is no doubt but also there needs to be a times a reminder of reality.

As many a seasoned international has said to me, the real work starts when you've tasted first team life. Let's continue to get behind our young talent and encourage them to take their dreams as far as they can. Enjoy the game

A League Of Our Own

John Adamson...and Crewe Alexandra

PART 1

Railway sheds like those at Crewe inspired one entrepreneur, whilst another involved the creator of a popular series of children's books. These two apparently disparate brainwaves both fed into the same dark passion. What was it? Let's journey on.

Our connections from Crewe are to Nottinghamshire and London Waterloo. The Midlands journey finds a man purporting to be a Red Indian Chief. He disappointingly turned out to be a retired ex-Cheshire headmaster with a delayed mid-life crisis. The southern scheme was a hobby guidebook written by an opportunist author, Ian Allen.

Our Big Chief, one Charles Warrell, rewarded children who completed his quiz books (and returned them to him at 'Wigwam on the Water') with a certificate and a feather. Records do not relate if any songbirds, raptors or warblers were mistreated in this process. Over half a million children responded, and the 'I Spy' tribe was born.

'I Spy On the Pavement' was one, useful given the post-war rise in dog walking. 'I Spy Cars' was another, and 'I Spy Fossils and Rocks' was there for the more determined. 'I Spy Dysfunctional Households' was never published. And we mustn't forget the classic 'I Spy on a Train Journey'.

In 1948's London Waterloo, from the maintenance shed where he worked, Ian Allen spotted a rising public fascination with locomotives, predominantly among the male of the species. He founded an inspirational hobby, which remains untouched by woke culture; trainspotting.

Warrell and Allen were about to change Britain's culture for ever. Children were bribed with bird parts, then brainwashed into thinking it was cool to collect loco numbers, with their elders given a

structure for them to cling to so it felt grown up too.

Allen identified different spotter types. Whilst detail was critical to all, the beginners and the amateurs just watched casually as the meticulous numbers men recorded each engine which flashed by in a special book. As photography became more accessible, another group evolved, requiring pictures as proof. Then there were the memorabilia men, tirelessly also looking for discarded tickets, timetables and leaflets.

Allen encouraged them to band together into clubs. Their uniform developed with the hobby, and winters were hard. The anorak, a coat native to Greenland's Inuit population, became de rigueur along with the inevitable tatty woolly hat. In Crewe, this was cutting edge fashion.

The best anoraks were less available in our Cheshire town than in the Arctic, being weatherproofed by the skin of a fresh seal or reindeer. The hobbyists gritted their teeth and bought greying modern versions. Synthetic anorak-manufacturers and trainspotter numbers continued to flourish.

On your next rail journey through Crewe, you might like to keep an eye out for them and count how many you see on platform ends. Maybe make a note? It gets compulsive. Spotting and spying are infectious.

'I Spy Trainspotters' was never written, but, after the anorak and the hat, the coffee flask would surely be the third item in the book, just before the notebook and two pencils. In case one broke.

Grimsby Town are the next side to make the trip to Prenton Park, as Paul Hurst's men look to secure all three points in Merseyside on Saturday 7 October 2023, with the tie commencing at 3.00pm.

The Mariners earned a point against today's opponents, Bradford City, at the start of September, and have had a solid start to the season; with a surprise 2-0 victory over high-flying Gillingham a highlight so far.

Manger, Paul Hurst is currently in his second spell at the club, after initially taking charge of Town in 2011 alongside Rob Scott, whose suspension lead to Hurst taking full charge in 2013. The 49-year-old oversaw Grimsby's return to the Football League in 2016, but left for Shrewsbury Town. In December 2020, he returned to Saturday's opponents, and has been in the manager's seat since, taking them back to the Football League again in 2022.

It would probably be no surprise that for tonight's image search, we've opted to choose one from the Arsenal night of fame – and one in particular that reflects the occasion off the pitch.



It portrays Chairman Bill Bothwell greeting the Rovers players who had travelled back to Merseyside the following day from London Euston, and arriving at Liverpool Lime Street, following the previous night's historic event.

The image was seen across the country, as Rovers lapped up the national headlines having beaten the Gunners on their own turf.

However, despite the famous victory, the 1973/74 season as a whole then proved to be little more than a passing phase, as a 16th place finish in Division Three was confirmed on 26 April 1974, following a 2-0 home win over Southend United.

Prior to the tie at Highbury, it had looked promising as Rovers had won five of their first ten games played, drawn three and losing just twice – but beyond this, league wins alone were hard to come by. In fact, they would only achieve another four victories before Boxing Day.

Even an impressive showing against Wolverhampton Wanderers in the Third Round of League Cup – with Loyden scoring again to draw 1-1 at Prenton Park, in a match which was played out in front of a crowd of 14,442 and almost saw Rovers steal a winner in the dying moments – was then undone by a unfortunate and slender 2-1 loss at Molineux in the replay two weeks later.

New Year's Day away to Plymouth Argyle kick started a

string of six straight defeats, which completed all of January and into February – and included a crushing 5-0 defeat at Blundell Park at the hands of a rampant Grimsby Town, which now gave cause for concern. Their form did pick up in the final ten games of the season, but by then, the leader clubs were out of sight, and Rovers were looking merely at consolidation and avoiding the drop.

There were though other general games and events of note – such as the Sunday matches staged both home and away during January and February, brought on by the national three-day week crisis, and in turn spawned some rather collectable matchday programmes. These were accompanied by additional teamsheets, all as part of a new entry rule to Prenton Park (for the visits of Aldershot, Bournemouth and Charlton Athletic) enforced by the Football League. In fact, Rovers' recorded 2,000 league game, a 0-0 draw away to Blackburn Rovers, also came under the Sunday rule on 17 February, with the same format of programme/teamsheet on offer to the 10,077 that attended.

Off the pitch, the famous five-span Cowshed roof, which had served Prenton Park and the fans since the early 1930s was then severely damaged in a storm and eventually removed in 1971. Its replacement was a new three-span structure, which was completed in time for the visit of Bury in the FA Cup First Round on 24 November.
